The Importance of ... “Retreat Work”

There is a deep significance to the work of a Retreat Network. Our community is very young and our experience with the spirit is even younger. Only with a ripening fullness of such experience will we begin to leaven the great teachings of the Fifth Epochal Revelation.

There is in our spiritual experience a deepening infusion of the values of spirit by which we are given the opportunity to serve as a leaven to all traditions, to all the peoples of this planet.

Richard Foster, a Quaker, wrote in his book on spiritual discipline that we suffer from superficiality. I believe this is true of our community. There is a great deal of woundedness and anger within many souls in our community that can **only** be healed by the spirit.

We are given a powerful insight in Paper 170, on page 1862, that there are “no less than five phases, or epochs, of the kingdom.” The first phase has to do with the **“personal and inward experience** of the spiritual life of the fellowship of the individual believer with God the Father.”

There is a gracious manner in which *The Urantia Book* invites us to inward experience without commanding us to it. In our ministry, we should be so gracious.

I would recommend that we as Urantia book reader/believers consider the model of a “Retreat Network.”

As a Network, our service would consist of:

- 1) Keeping in constant touch with one another, learning from one another and encouraging each other,
- 2) Generating a newsletter periodically that would serve to notify the Network of our retreat schedule,
- 3) Sharing information of our retreat activities via our community’s web sites, and
- 4) Widening the circle of our Network by encouraging a dedication to the exploration of “personal and inward experience.”

Our mission would be to inaugurate more fully the first phase of the kingdom within our community by fostering the desire to “live as if in the presence of God,” calling people to a deep commitment to this initial phase of the kingdom.

Said our Master, “I want them all to be one, even as you and I are one if they love one another as I have loved them, all men will then believe that I came forth from you and be willing to receive the revelation of truth and glory which I have made.” *pg. 1964*

May we all come to experience the real unity, joy and peace that arises from our deep inward contact with God’s indwelling spirit. ■

RETREAT NETWORK INAUGURAL MEETING

The weekend of November 5-7 was a very special one in Oklahoma. The weather was unusually mild, as if summer refused to relinquish its warm sunshine and clear days. For twenty Urantians an additional blessing was about to unfold – this group of twenty souls had gathered to embark on a brave new service adventure. They came from coast to coast and neighboring Canada for the sole purpose of forming a network to foster and support spiritual retreats.

This gathering of spiritual seekers grew out of a shared sentiment that the time had come for an expansion of the retreat experience of contemplatively seeking the inner voice. As the idea unfolded soon it was evident that there truly was a kindred spirit, a zeitgeist of interest, in this important facet of our spiritual lives. Someone suggested that it would be a good idea to organize a meeting to explore the idea of forming a “network” of those interested in retreat work. Eventually, a time and place was selected and interested parties gathered to commune with the *Spirit* and foster the birth of an idea – for many – a dream.

The result of this remarkable weekend – beyond the forging of lasting friendships – was the creation of **The Retreat Network**. This network was established as a means to connect individuals and groups that are planning spiritual retreats, and to gather and disseminate useful information on retreats. It is not intended to be another social organization, but rather a true networking of individuals and groups committed to fostering the growth of the inner spiritual life.

One of the important outcomes of the weekend was the drafting of a mission statement. It reads: **“To support one another in facilitating and enhancing the individual’s relationship with the indwelling spirit through the retreat experience, that all may be better equipped to serve the family of human kind.”** This statement provides a centering framework wherein all involved may pursue their own unique retreat projects. It was clear that unity of spiritual purpose, not uniformity of retreat structure, was of primary importance.

The planning group agreed on three other key projects: a newsletter, a website, and the continuation of the retreat network internet bulletin board. The newsletter will be published either annually or biannually, and will include articles on retreat topics as well as a calendar with the time and location of retreats around the country. The website, at www.retreatnetwork.org, includes the newsletter, but will also be a resource for retreat organizers. Those who have been active in retreat work have developed and compiled excellent information and material that will be of great value to others in their work. The retreat network list will continue to serve as an immediate means of connection, and as an avenue for disseminating relevant information.



The Planning Group

The weekend culminated with a worship service on Sunday morning. The depth of spiritual unity and worship experienced by all present made the importance of the work we had undertaken self-evident. If only more souls on our planet could experience such supernal spiritual joy their

appetite for spiritual food would surely be reawakened. In our Urantia community we have made great strides in the arena of mind. Now the time is ripe for our community of believers to more fully discover what Jesus called the first phase of the kingdom, *“The personal and inward experience of the spiritual life of the fellowship of the individual believer with God the Father.”* (P.1862)

Experiencing the Presence of God

“An experience of the presence of God”- that was the answer to the question we asked ourselves: “What do we want people to get from the program we are planning?”

“The Urantia Book Readers” who later became “Adventures in Spiritual Living” had gathered to plan a three-day program. We tossed around ideas until we realized that our goal was to give participants an experience of the presence of God, an experience that would excite them spiritually and help to fuel the growth of their relationship with God.

We eventually decided that our program would not be a conference with the customary activities of speeches, discussion groups, and study groups. Instead we evolved a focus and a process. Our focus would be on spiritual techniques which came out of our own experience. Our process in the program would be to describe a technique, ask participants to try the technique, and then invite everyone to share from their experience the insights, feelings, thoughts and truths they choose to share. We decided to categorize the type of program we were planning as a retreat, to distinguish it from a conference.

Over the next year our group traveled from around the state to spend the weekend together about once a month. We tested a number of techniques. Selecting the

most successful, we put on the first “Adventures in Spiritual Living” retreat at Mo Ranch in the hill country of Texas in 1989. After the retreat was over and the participants had all left, we gathered close together and came to some realizations:

- 1) *we loved doing the retreat,*
- 2) *the results were better than we had ever expected, and*
- 3) *we very much wanted to do more retreats.*

After reflection, we also realized that the retreat with its focus on sharing our spiritual lives had achieved the atmosphere of communion described in *The Urantia Book*, going well beyond the social setting of most conferences. The atmosphere of communion bonds people and empowers them spiritually.

The techniques we use in “Adventures in Spiritual Living” retreats are chosen for their ability to make us more aware of God and God’s will for us. Many of them, such as *Seeing with God’s Eyes* and *Prayer in the Moment*, are very basic and practical techniques which bring God into our everyday lives.

They can be used by a group or by an individual. Our retreat planning also offers precious opportunities for us to experiment with creative art forms, such as writing visualizations, telling stories, selecting spiritually evocative pictures and music, and planning group celebrations and worships. Imagination is important to us as planners and to the participants. The creative imagination is an excellent pathway to the superconscious.

Variety is a useful trait for any group retreat. Each person has characteristic preferences for individual activities vs. group activities, structured events vs.

those that are relaxed and flexible, thinking vs. feeling and sensory experience vs. intuition. It is beneficial to offer a variety of activities in order to appeal to various preferences.

One of the most liberating things we have learned over the years is that we who plan the retreat are in reality only the human side of the team - and the junior staff! All we have to do is set up an environment in which the spirit can do its own work - we are just the helpers, not the responsible ones. Experiencing the presence of

God depends as much on the openness and expectancy of the participant as it does the nature of the exercise. The spirit can use all sorts of activities to reach into the hearts, minds and souls of those who attend a retreat. The spirit eagerly awaits the smallest invitation into our inner lives. ■

The Value of Retreats

Some people have the idea that retreats are self-serving havens for like-minded types. This is not my experience. I once hosted a Urantia retreat where two new readers clashed so badly the first day we almost had a war. The group reckoned that if we couldn't get along on a spiritual retreat, there wasn't much hope for our world, so we'd better try harder. For five days our better selves prevailed, and thanks to our unseen helpers and a very talented life-skills facilitator, we learned new ways to communicate respectfully and no one left in a huff. Human differences surface quickly in small groups and when our tolerance level is challenged, it becomes necessary to stretch and grow in understanding and appreciating others. This is a benefit that lingers long after a retreat has ended.

Retreats don't replace much needed study groups, conferences, and/or service projects, but they can provide an additional learning option for Urantia book readers. On page 196, a Universal Censor points out that we mortals develop self-consciousness as "communal consciousness" and that we seek out this understanding of ourselves and others on four levels:

- 1) the quest to know the facts,
2) the quest to understand our duty,
3) the quest to experience God firsthand, and
4) the quest to recognize our relationship with God and each other as part of the Father's personality circuit.

Retreats tend to emphasize self-conscious realization on the last two levels - enhanced personal religious experience and the discovery of personality values in others. This focus on relationship and personality is joyful because it has no other agenda, no ulterior motive. I believe that retreats offer apolitical time-outs which can enlarge our capacity to live together compassionately across deep differences.

I've hosted or attended many retreats and each one was significant for its lessons in self-awareness, personality appreciation, and group harmony. Here are a few observations:

... Retreats attract people, from all organizations and none, who yearn for a larger spiritual community.

... Trained facilitators are invaluable. Facilitators are mainly interested in helping us discern divinity in our lives.

... A retreat is not a place for debate or to exercise the need to be "right". The "Spirit of Truth" works to curb aggressive or assertive thinking and behavior.

... The best retreats last at least two days and two nights and take place in a personal place, preferably someone's home.

... The more time together the better the chance to develop confidentiality, trust, honesty, and group loyalty.

... Sharing thoughts and feelings is encouraged but individual privacy is honored; people participate only when they are ready.

... Prayer and worship are the spiritual fulcrums of life-changing insights and perspectives.

... Shared goals and group worship lead to group harmony.

... Retreats are a practice arena for learning skills such as listening for understanding, recapitulation, celebrating differences, honoring the person as a potential manifestation of some part of the Father's personality, giving and receiving feedback, suspending judgement, and acknowledging our limited viewpoints.

... Retreats allow for giving and receiving God's love among those who might otherwise seem like strangers.

... During a retreat, some feel God's presence in themselves and others in such perfect alignment with the Father's personality circuit, that Divine love floods their souls and some even experience the personal presence of the Son.

... Retreats spawn an increased yield of the fruits of the spirit in the lives of retreaters.

... Retreats can give a glimpse now of what light and life will some day be.

EXCERPTS FROM RETREATS HELD IN FEBRUARY

I so much enjoyed our retreat time together, and was impressed by a number of things which I would like to relate.

** That each person, in any community setting (and a retreat is a small community setting) contributes enormously. First, just by being there, and secondly, by what they bring to the experience in gifts or expertise. But the first gift is their presence.*

** That the experience of hearing and witnessing who and what others honor, pray for, and fear helps me to understand, and love them more, and to understand myself better too.*

** That our exploration into retreating is, for me, a very different experience than that of a conference in that my expressed purpose is to gather primarily for being together in God's presence, rather than to study, party, socialize, or work. Those things may happen too, but first and foremost for me is the purpose of just being together with my brothers and sisters in the presence of God, and acknowledging that.*

... no words can express the spiritual bonding that took place within us and between us.

Besides being a blessed respite from my daily routine, it was a way to catch glimpses of God in each human being as if my capacity were heightened; a way for the soul to heal and find safe haven to express a bit more of its unique divinity with other souls.

I am stronger this week by having come together with a group of beings who have vision and purpose in their lives. I came away feeling we are clearly about the Father's business when we seek to deepen relationships and worship the Divine together, bringing this power back into our lives.

Being consciously part of God's flow of living love IS the greatest service I know for us, for everyone, and for the future of this world!

No matter the overall tone or personality of the group of people getting together, a gathering is a "retreat" if the intent of the individuals choosing to come together is to find and to know God experientially (personally), or to grow further in their direct experiencing of God.

We are all better when we are together in the purpose of finding our Father.

For me, participation by all is very important ... the more I see each individual encouraged and enabled to be fully participating, not just sitting in the audience and getting mentally stimulated, the closer we come to reality.
